Introducing Matt Brown

Matt brings strong on-ice expertise, leadership experience, and a deep commitment to long-term player development.

A graduate of Simon Fraser University, Matt has worked with players of all ages and skill levels—from U6 to professionals in the NHL and PWHL. His coaching philosophy is rooted in skating fundamentals, skill-specific development, and mentorship, with a focus on fostering both athletes and well-rounded individuals.

As a player, Matt built a successful junior career in the BCHL with the Surrey Eagles before joining the Richmond Sockeyes, where he played a pivotal role in capturing the Cyclone Taylor Cup and later served as team captain. He continued his career at SFU, helping lead the team to a BCIHL Championship. These experiences shaped his athlete-centered approach and his drive to create a positive, competitive, and inclusive hockey culture.

Matt has coached with several organizations, including the Richmond Sockeyes, Prince of Wales Hockey Program, Thunderbirds Minor Hockey, Kodiaks Spring Program, and Van Minor. He has also successfully operated a hockey development business, further expanding his knowledge and expertise.

Throughout his coaching career, Matt has developed and executed structured programs that prioritize player progression, skill acquisition, and long-term athlete development. His high-performance training models are designed to support players at their current stage while challenging them to reach their full potential. These programs emphasize strong technical foundations and a positive, growth-oriented environment.

In addition to player development, Matt is committed to coach education and mentorship. He promotes consistency, accountability, and a shared development approach across all teams and age groups. His leadership style emphasizes clear communication, collaboration, and continuous improvement for both players and coaches.



VP1 Chris Bedyk

The Discipline Committee oversees the review of disciplinary decisions and misconduct penalties involving players, members, parents, and team officials. Our goal is to ensure fair and consistent application of VMHA's conduct policies.

This year, the committee managed numerous concerns that, while not escalating to formal complaints, required support and guidance for coaches, team managers, and division managers. Building strong relationships and maintaining open communication with all parties has been a key focus.

Moving forward, we aim to enhance collaboration with division managers by clarifying the complaint process and distinguishing between team-level and association-level issues. We extend our gratitude to the Conflict Resolution Committee for their invaluable support throughout the season.

Risk Management - VP3 Todd Chisholm

Thanks to all of our HCSPs working behind the scenes at all of our games and practices! It's a critical job that keeps our players, coaches, and officials safe on the ice and at other VMHA events. There's a lot that goes into that job that members may not realize, in addition to taking care of any injuries.

Checking that neck guards (and maybe keeping an extra handy) are on and skate guards are off before the players step on the ice, fixing broken skate laces, finding lost gear, checking for gear left behind in the change rooms, and making sure no one is alone while waiting for pickup after the game or practice. It's a great way to help out on a team and get to know the players better.

This coming season, I'd like to develop a community for our HCSPs. For example, we've been working on ways to share incident reports and outcomes (with all personal details removed) with our safeties so that we're all aware of and prepared for issues and injuries that can occur.

Thanks also to our VMHA officials and the parents who drive them to do their job! I've been very pleased with the direction of our officiating program, lead by our Referee in Chief Rupert and our Ref Assignor Sharlene. Our officials are well-trained, with great attendance in our training sessions and through the excellent feedback from our in-game supervisions. This makes a huge difference in the quality of VMHA officiating, and our officials know that they have a positive, supportive environment to get their questions answered and concerns addressed. It's a challenging job that affords great opportunities for young players to improve their understanding of the game, get more time on skates, and build confidence.

Training Centre & VP2 John Lavery

The 2024/2025 season was one of steady growth and development of groups at the Training Centre. With 100% utilization by our rep teams, the TC began to integrate as the unique and critical piece of infrastructure that was originally envisioned. It continued to enable VMHA to provide additional training and skills opportunities to all levels of players and coaches outside of programmed ice time.

Throughout the season, Rep teams take up weekly training opportunities at the TC, with U18A1 taking two. Vancouver Angels took up a weekly ice time, and T-Birds again tried the facility out. Notably we continued to have external contractors use the facility, providing a small income stream which we aim to grow this coming year. Collectively, the teams using the facility again won honours throughout the season, including several banners and tournaments, with one team making it to the Final Four.

This year spring and summer programming have come to the TC. Regular goalie and young player shooting development have taken root, and it is hoped that older age-groups will begin using the facility for summer training, in order to meet the high expectations placed on our rep team by incoming Hockey Direction. The TC is placed to be an important part of improved development and skills work as we welcome Matt Brown as our Director of Hockey.

Recreational Hockey flourished again this year, with near record numbers of players participating with VMHA. From U11 through to U18 and U21, teams had successful years of growth, with relatively low numbers of conflict situations or disciplinary issues.

Changes and evolution to the balancing process for Recreational stream hockey continue to improve our ability to field balanced teams, while from a board perspective, we continue to advocate, particularly at the U18 level, for at least one tier of competitive recreational hockey streams. This advocacy with PCAHA is intended to improve the recreational hockey experience for all levels of players, as balancing becomes more difficult with a broader skill set required for each team. We look forward to a strong 2025/26 season in the recreational stream and at the TC for VMHA

Director of Initiation Tim Matthews

This was the first season where VMHA had a dedicated director in place for the Initiation divisions (U7 and U9), and what a year it was. The VMHA Initiation Program grew from 3 U7 teams and 6 U9 teams in 2023–2024 to 5 U7 teams and 7 U9 teams in 2024–2025. The future is definitely bright at VMHA.

The U9 season at VMHA was a little different than in years past because we were part of a pilot program that involved starting full-ice games at the start of December rather than in mid-January. It's not clear if a December start to full-ice games will continue next season, but preliminary feedback suggests that an earlier start to full-ice play is seen as a positive.

Other items of note in Initiation this season were a more structured approach to affiliating players between divisions, an increase in the number of skill sessions that were offered, and great camaraderie and collaboration between the teams that shared practice times. The goal is to continue to build on these successes in 2025-2026.

In closing, it's important to recognize all the excellent work that was put in by the U7 and U9 coaches, team managers, HCSPs and division managers. The enthusiasm and energy of these volunteers was infectious, and was likely the most important factor in the Initiation program being a positive and enjoyable environment for our players. Kudos to you all.

Fundraising Kristy Streefkerk

VMHA had a strong year of fundraising and community engagement. The second annual Shoot-a-Thon was a major success, raising \$27,325 with participation from 135 players. With all VMHA players invited to take part in on-ice events during photo day. Looking ahead, plans are in place to hold the event later in the season, and move it back to the training center to preserve valuable December ice time. The Holiday Skate also brought the community together, resulting in a \$155 donation to the Vancouver Food Bank. Additionally, VMHA launched its official sponsorship program and is actively seeking sponsors for the 2025/2026 season—more details can be found on the website.

Referee-In-Chief Rupert Xu

This past season (2024–25) we saw a huge influx of supervisions. With 93 supervisions and 20 shadows, more than 40% of our "A" home games were supervised. This allowed for continued development and more consistent feedback for the officials. The development of our officials showed as we got many praises from adult officials from across the lower mainland and local RIC's. Officials also have voiced their gratitude for the amount of development and support they've received.



We had three returning officials clinics in September which was a huge success. Over 20+ participants at each clinic. The clinic consisted of an on ice portion + an off-ice classroom style portion. Which allowed officials to ask questions and clarify certain rules before the season began.

We also had two additional clinics, one in October and one in November on pro-d days which also garnered a lot of interest, between 15-20 officials attended those.

Overall, the season was a huge success with many officials being supervised multiple times throughout the season to ensure the proper standard is being followed.

Congratulations to our own RIC, Rupert Xu, for receiving this year's PCAHA Head Referee of the Year Award. This award recognizes the Association Referee-in-Chief who has made an outstanding contribution to the development of officiating in conjunction with his/her Association. As VMHA's Referee-in-Chief, Rupert has significantly enhanced the officiating program, growing our numbers of certified officials and implementing rigorous training and mentorship programs. His efforts have led to high-quality officiating, positive feedback from the community, and a waitlist of eager new officials.

Referee Allocator Sharlene Steele

Thank you, VMHA officials, for another successful season! As Referee Assignor for VMHA, I oversee officials for U9 to U13 rep and house games. Under Referee-in-Chief Rupert Xu's leadership, officials began the season with on-ice and classroom clinics. Rupert and a group of senior officials also ran two mid-season clinics, including a high-performance session. He led a core team that conducted 93 supervisions, helping officials grow. Rupert also certified 19 new officials through classroom and on-ice clinics, plus on-ice shadowing. These new officials were mentored for 20 games by our own Level 2s.

We've seen steady improvement throughout the season. Officials were recognized via our Spotlight of the Month and monthly rule book quizzes. Notably, two of our female officials were selected to officiate at Provincials—an outstanding achievement that reflects the quality of Rupert's mentorship. Thank you to all VMHA teams who supported Officials Recognition Week!

This season, 522 were assigned games, including tryouts, regular season, playoffs, and tournaments. VMHA has 83 active officials—19 new first-years and 20 adults who regularly officiate. We've retained several second- and third-year officials, a key success. With 17 officials graduating this year, we hope many continue with us as adult officials. We aim to offer ongoing training and more clinic opportunities to build confidence and experience.

Our VMHA Annual Charity Tournament was another great success, using 87 officials from 11 associations—62 from VMHA. Bronze and gold medal games offered a chance to officiate in a four-person system at the U15A level. Our tournament has earned a strong reputation, and it shows in how well we support our officials.

As an association, we'll continue working with our VMHA community—parents, players, and coaches—to foster a respectful, supportive environment for our officials. Their role is vital, and we're committed to their well-being. Official retention remains a top concern across all minor hockey associations.
